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Purpose

The Central New England Fishery Resources Office was established to coordinate and implement cooperative inter-jurisdictional fish and aquatic resource restoration and recovery programs in the Merrimack River and Central New England watersheds.

Management Activities

- Develop and implement inter-jurisdictional fish and aquatic resource restoration and recovery programs in central New England.

- Manage river herring and American shad restoration programs in New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Maine coastal rivers, including the Merrimack River.
- Assist in the production and release of three million Atlantic salmon throughout the Merrimack River in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, in coastal watersheds in New Hampshire and in the Pawcatuck/Wood rivers in Rhode Island.
- Conduct fish stock assessments in central New England watersheds, including the Merrimack River in New Hampshire and Massachusetts.
- Provide fisheries management and evaluation assistance to the National Fish Hatchery System.
- Participate and coordinate in management initiatives involving state fishery resource agencies and regional and local watershed associations.

Highlights


River herring, American shad, Atlantic salmon, American eel, sea lamprey and striped bass restoration initiatives in central New England watersheds.

Aquatic and fishery resource evaluations on Service and tribal lands and Department of Defense facilities.

The Adopt-A-Salmon Family Program, a New England-based watershed education program in 50 middle schools in central New England.

Public support and healthy watersheds for sustainable fisheries.

Interjurisdictional fish habitat restoration initiatives involving dam removal, fishway construction and maintenance and aquatic habitat improvements.



Issues

Depressed populations of river herring, American shad, American eels and Atlantic salmon

Inadequate fish passage in coastal watersheds and the Merrimack River watershed

Adequate maintenance for Atlantic salmon and migratory fish recovery programs

Restoration of aquatic habitat for migratory fish and aquatic resources
